Our IM soccer team had an amazing season, only to lose on penalty kicks in the finals late in the Fall. In the winter term we tried to repeat our IM hockey championship, but saw a bitter defeat in the playoffs.

Construction on the new house continued and the brotherhood was able to move into the house on March 25, right before Spring term. While there are some finishing touches before opening up to the public, the house at 1 Webster Avenue filled with Tri-Kaps once again. We look forward to welcoming back alumni for Green Key Weekend, Commencement and Reunions.

As I hand over the reins to incoming president **Ted Poatsy '17**, I just want to say what an honor and a privilege it has been to be the president of this great fraternity. It has been an extremely busy year for us all! Much has happened at the College and at the house.

The biggest news: it's official! The undergraduates have moved into a newly renovated house! A wonderful mix of old and new has come into being thanks to our own **Bruce Williamson '74**. The basement is all new total eliminating the old kitchen and tube room/weight room which was constantly flooding. The upstairs bathroom – long a source of trouble – has been moved and redone. The Great Hall and the GOTE room are, to use a phrase from the Talking Heads "Same as it they ever was".

For Bruce this has been a labor of love and we owe a huge debt of thanks to him. He not only oversaw the construction effort but dealt with the various Town agencies which required some delicate negotiations. With only a few areas left to be completed, as you will see from the other articles in this edition, the house is proving already to be a place for great experiences and significantly lower operational costs.

We also owe a debt of thanks to those of you who have contributed hundreds and hundreds of thousands of dollars so far to get construction to where it is today. Now the long work begins to pay the over \$2 million loan we took out from the College.

The undergraduates under the leadership of past Treasurer Josh Tupler '16 and current Treasurer Sam Libby '17 with guidance from our alumni Treasurer Terry Lowd '66, Vice-Chairman Sunil Bhagavath '03, and former undergraduate Treasurer Brett Szalapski '15 have created a budget that shows the undergraduates repaying a substantial amount of the loan. But they alone cannot repay the entire loan. We need you, faithful alumni, to help cover the repayment. No amount is too small. Hundreds of Tri-Kap alumni have contributed to the Campaign. 



## Philanthropy Chairman's Report

Over the fall and winter terms Tri-Kap's philanthropy has continued to thrive. Not only have we continued to host our most popular events, but we have also begun to develop new fundraisers while increasing incentives for brotherhood participation in community service.

The fall saw the return of Tri-Kap's annual Haunted House which, true to form, was yet another great success. Without the halls of 1 Webster this year, the sisters of Alpha Xi Delta graciously offered to co-host the event in their facility. Over a dozen families attended throughout the afternoon on Halloween, and the feedback we received from the participants was fabulous. The brothers were excited to give back to the community while also furthering our connections with the sisters of AZD. We hope to engage in more joint opportunities like this moving forward.

To further incentivize brotherhood participation in philanthropy, we instituted the first ever brotherhood philanthropy requirement. This rule requires brothers to complete a minimum number of approved philanthropy hours to become eligible to attend formal at the end of the term. This new incentive structure has proven extremely effective in increasing Tri-Kap's standing within both the Dartmouth and Upper Valley communities.

This winter, Tri-Kap was invited to run a booth in the multi-house Collis Winter Bazaar, a charity event sponsored by the local chapter of Relay for Life. The coordinators asked Tri-Kap to run a table called the "Tri-Kap Masters Challenge", in which participants would donate to play water pong against one of Tri-Kap's Masters Champions. The house raised over \$100 in a very short time span, well exceeding the goals of the Bazaar organizers.








Also survived by 5 grandchildren: Samantha, Kyle, Parker, Anna Rose and Rachel.

#### Alan W. Lott '45

Alan Worman Lott, 91, was born on July 4, 1923 in Westport, New York. Alan passed away peacefully on May 31, 2015 in West Palm Beach. He entered Dartmouth College in 1941. From 1943-1946, Alan served in US Army - European Theater. He reentered Dartmouth College and graduated in 1945. In 1951, he married the love of his life, Jean Morgan, in Westport. Alan was an executive of Permatex Co. from 1954-1968. They lived in Huntington, Long Island until moving to West Palm Beach with the company headquarters in 1961. They lived and enjoyed Palm Beach a number of years.

The Lotts moved to Vero Beach where they shared a rich, active life for 35 years. He started Design Habitat, an imported ceramic tile business. Alan was also the business manager of Jean Lott, Inc., his wife's successful apparel business. For most of his life, he played a "mean game of tennis". He was a jazz enthusiast and an active member of the Jazz Association. He enjoyed lunch at the Ocean Grill with friends, reading The Wall Street Journal, and gin martinis.
